The word <i>and</i> often joins two short sentences. Since <i>and</i> is joining two sentences together, it is known as a conjunction. Other conjunctions are <i>but</i> and <i>or</i> . Anytime these conjunctions join two complete sentences together or two independent clauses, we place a comma before the word. Notice in the sentence above the comma is before the word <i>and</i> . The sentences below show more examples.

Commas are used to separate the parts of a compound sentence.

In sentence one a comma was used before a conjunction to separate two different thoughts.

Sometimes we use a comma when we are listing three or more things.
